Please remember to switch off your mobile phone (or put it on silent) when coming into Church.



LISTEN TO THE WORD

11TH MAY 2025 - FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER Acts 13: 14, 43b-52 | Psalm 100 | Revelation 7: 9, 14b—17 | John 10: 27-30

The shepherds of the Old Testament led a lonely, dangerous life. Sheep were an important asset in the economy of their land. They needed to be on their guard against both human and animal predators. Some shepherds were hired hands, but others had close relationships with their flocks, they knew each one by name. They lived in the hills of the high country, beset by the conditions, heat in summer, cold in winter, their nights filled with the sounds of the wind, ever vigilant and far from human company, the smell of the sheep was strong and made them isolated by the nearby village communities.

Shepherds were the first to hear of the birth of our saviour. The wondrous song of the Angels calling them down from the hills to the village of Bethlehem and a wooden stall in a cave where the King of Kings was laid. We hear stories of shepherds throughout the Bible. Abraham had his flocks, Moses minded the flocks of his father-in-law Jethro, the well where Jesus met the Samaritan Woman was built for the flocks of Jacob and his sons. The parable of the lost sheep reminds us of the compassion of God who, forsaking the ninety-nine who are safe, leaves them to search for the one who is missing.

When Jesus says that He is the Good Shepherd he is announcing a message to His people, His flock. Many shepherds were hired men who had no bond with their sheep and when trouble came, they would disappear leaving the sheep to their fate. Jesus knows His sheep and they know Him. He does not run away but stays with his sheep, his people, and sees them through whatever may befall them. We hear his voice each time the Word of God is proclaimed. This is a tremendous gift that we sometimes take for granted; familiar stories often lose their impact through repetition. If Jesus appeared amongst us and spoke, we would be lost for words and cling to his message. He speaks to us in the Gospels, He is really present in the Word we hear at Mass; we must hold each sentence in our hearts, and it will feed us, as the Eucharist feeds us. Never lose your love for the Word for it is a gift from God that will guide, nurture and lead you to eternal life.

A prayer based on John 10: 27 "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me"

Lord

Guide me when I read your Gospel that I may begin to make sense of my life
Open my mind so that I may hear your voice in the word I read.

Teach me that there are no quick answers or easy rides on my journey but if I
follow where you lead I will find you

LITURGY OF THE WORD FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER (C)

THE ORDER OF MASS CAN BE FOUND ON PAGE 4 OF THE HYMN BOOK

First Reading

Acts 13:14, 43b-52

In those days: Paul and Barnabas went on from Perga and came to Antioch in Pisidia. And on the Sabbath day they went into the synagogue and sat down. Many Jews and devout converts to Judaism followed Paul and Barnabas, who, as they spoke with them, urged them to continue in the grace of God.

The next Sabbath almost the whole city gathered to hear the word of the Lord. But when the Jews saw the crowds, they were filled with jealousy and began to contradict what was spoken by Paul, reviling him. And Paul and Barnabas spoke out boldly, saying, 'It was necessary that the word of God be spoken first to you. Since you thrust it aside and judge yourselves unworthy of eternal life, behold, we are turning to the Gentiles. For so the Lord has commanded us, saying, "I have made you a light for the Gentiles, that you may bring salvation to the ends of the earth." 'And when the Gentiles heard this, they began rejoicing and glorifying the word of the Lord, and as many as were appointed to eternal life believed. And the word of the Lord was spreading throughout the whole region. But the Jews incited the devout women of high standing and the leading men of the city, stirred up persecution against Paul and Barnabas, and drove them out of their district. But they shook off the dust from their feet against them and went to Iconium. And the disciples were filled with joy and with the Holy Spirit.

They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more; the sun shall not strike them, nor any scorching heat. For the Lamb in the midst of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of living water, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.'

'HOPE IN A TIME OF DARKNESS'

A Lecture by His Eminence Cardinal Timothy Radcliffe OP Monday 23rd June 2025; 7:45pm Galilee Chapel, Durham Cathedral

Durham Cathedral Institute is delighted to be hosting this year's Bishop Dunn Memorial Lecture of the Centre for Catholic Studies at Durham University, hearing from speaker Cardinal Timothy Radcliffe and respondent Prof Anna Rowlands.

Cardinal Radcliffe is a distinguished Catholic priest, theologian, and church leader. Between 1992 and 2001, he served as Master of the Order of Preachers (also known as the Dominican Order). Radcliffe received an honorary Doctorate of Divinity from the University of Oxford in 2003; in 2023, he was appointed preacher to the Catholic Church's Synod on Synodality, and was made cardinal by Pope Francis in December 2024.

Anna Rowlands (respondent) is St Hilda Professor of Catholic Social Thought and Practice at Durham University. She is a political theologian whose research interests include the ethics of migration and the tradition of Catholic Social Teaching. In 2023, Rowlands took up a two-year secondment at the Vatican, where she contributed to the global synodal process.

MEMORIALS AT ST PATRICK'S CHURCHYARD

It has come to our attention that there has been some confusion regarding the installation of new headstones at St Patrick's Church, Dipton. As a result, we would like to reiterate to any families wishing to install headstones that we require the following **before** any memorial is installed in the churchyard:

- Any and all plans for the memorial are to be forwarded to the church office at stjoseph.stanley@diocesehn.org.uk. This includes dimensions and any intended inscriptions. This is so that we can ensure the headstone will not encroach onto any nearby plots and that inscriptions are appropriate for the churchyard. Permission will be given to go ahead once the designs have approved.
- Any headstones intended for an ashes plot can not be larger than 18" tall or 14" wide, in line with the smaller headstones already in place. Please contact the office for examples.

GRAVES AT ST PATRICK'S CHURCHYARD

There are only 18 graves left for burial in St Patrick's Churchyard. Parishioners are able to pre-purchase a plot if they wish to. Please contact the parish office if you would like to pre-purchase a plot or for further details. Once all the plots are taken, the churchyard will be known as a "Closed" churchyard, and only those with existing graves will be allowed to be buried there. There is still room for cremated remains.
