
A GENTLE REMINDER...

LISTEN TO THE WORD

 31^{st} August 2025 - 22^{nd} Sunday in Ordinary Time Sirach 3: 17-18, 20, 28-29 | Psalm 67 | Hebrews 12: 18-19, 22-24 | Luke 14: 1, 7-14

Over the last few weeks, the readings have been based on the qualities of those who follow Our Blessed Lord. Today we come to perhaps the most difficult of these qualities: Humility. Today we need to stop and consider just what it is that Christ is calling us to do. The passage from the Book of Sirach calls upon us to be humble. Pride is a malady, a failure to love others more than ourselves. Humility should be at the heart of all we do and speak. The greater we are, the more wealth we possess, the harder it is to be humble.

There is something majestic in the reading from Hebrews. It is a reminder that what we believe in is not small or insignificant but something so huge, so awesome that it passes beyond our understanding, something that may not even be touched. We are "the assembly of first born who are enrolled in heaven". We are called to the heavenly Jerusalem. If we could only understand that, when we live in the love of Christ, we become the "spirits of the righteous", then we would begin to recognise what His great gift to us truly means.

The parable in the Gospel reading reminds us that we should not be judged by the way the world looks upon us but by our actions. Jesus is teaching the rich people who are listening about humility. They, and we, may judge a person by his wealth or his looks and reputation; Jesus looks beyond these things into the heart and sees the motives behind the action. He urges us not to seek the highest place at the feast but be satisfied with the low place for then we will be judged as ourselves and not by our presumed status. We can then rise to our proper place and find our seat at the banquet of heaven.

A Prayer based on Luke 14: 10

"For everyone who exalts himself shall be humbled and he who humbles himself shall be exalted"

Pride is a sin which is so easy to commit.

We often want to show ourselves to others as being successful or important and so we portray our achievements before us.

But all our accomplishments came from you. Whatever we attain it is ultimately your grace which inspires us.

Remind us Lord to be humble. To do what you wish but quietly, without

He said also to the man who had invited him, 'When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends, or your brothers and sisters or your relatives or rich neighbours, lest they also invite you in return and you be repaid. But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. For you will be repaid at the resurrection of the just.'



FREE FILM NIGHT

Our next free film night will be this Friday at 7.00pm in the meeting room at St Joseph's. We will be watching the film *One Life*, starring Anthony Hopkins. (We were meant to watch it in July, but the DVD wouldn't work!)

The true story of Sir Nicholas 'Nicky' Winton, a young London broker who, in the months leading up to World War II, rescued 669 predominantly Jewish children from the Nazis. Nicky visited Prague in December 1938 and found families who had fled the rise of the Nazis in Germany and Austria, living in desperate conditions with little or no shelter and food, and under threat of Nazi invasion. He immediately realized it was a race against time. How many children could he and the team rescue before the borders closed? Fifty years later, it's 1988 and Nicky lives haunted by the fate of the children he wasn't able to bring to safety in England; always blaming himself for not doing more. It's not until a live BBC television show, 'That's Life', surprises him by introducing him to some surviving children - now adults - that he finally begins to come to terms with the guilt and grief he had carried for five decades.

The film is suitable for those aged 12 and above.
